## Highlights from our last meeting

**November 15, 2005**

Guest speaker Linda Clontz, manager of the 911 Communications Center, spoke to the group about how calls to the center are prioritized.

The operators at 911 answer over 4,500 calls per day – 365 days per year. With such a volume of calls, 911 operators must prioritize how they dispatch emergency personnel. Calls where imminent danger or injury has occurred are given the highest priority and calls for such items as abandoned vehicles are lowest. Just because a call is given a lower priority it doesn't mean that it is of less importance to the police. It just means that it will take longer for them to respond.

- Public Safety Report from Kenny Faulkner – we have had several breaking and entry calls to service in October. They have arrested on suspect. In a October 25<sup>th</sup> prostitution round-up only two girls were arrested. A good sign that activity is considerably less than in past months.
- Community Grant – Camp Greene was awarded a grant to help the association with organization and communication. This grant will be paying for the monthly meeting reminder postcards, a quarterly newsletter, and aid in setting up our website. Look for the Winter edition of the newsletter soon.
